The Namport Social Investment Fund (NSIF) is the vehicle through which the Namibian Ports Authority (Namport) contribute to the development of a better Namibia by investing into corporate social responsibility projects that seek to uplift the lives and livelihoods of all Namibians. The Fund has, since its formation in 2006, responded to the social development needs of the communities in which we operate through a prudent sharing of Namport's resources. The Fund's corporate social investment programme is based on identified four focus areas namely: Health, Quality Education, Environment and Entrepreneurship.

HEALTH

The Fund invests in the development of community health infrastructure and health services in order to protect the health, wellbeing and welfare needs of our people. Specifically, the Fund supported primary health care projects, constructed clinics and assisted in the improvement of health surveillance along our national trade corridors.

QUALITY EDUCATION

The Fund supports educational initiatives covering the full spectrum right from early childhood development to primary, secondary and tertiary education with a special focus on science and mathematics. The overall objective is to improve quality of education and improve knowledge of all Namibians including but not limited to classroom construction, provision of educational tools and providing sanitation to rural Namibian schools.

ENVIRONMENT

The focus for our environmental pillar is premised on the need to ensure environmental preservation by supporting initiatives that seek to promote environmental stewardship and climate change mitigation measures.

ENTREPRENEURIAL SKILLS/ SMALL AND MEDIUM ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT

The Foundation's fourth focus area i.e., “*entrepreneurial skills/ small and medium enterprise development*” is premised on the Chinese adage of “*Give a man a fish and you feed him for a day. Teach him how to fish and you feed him for a lifetime*”. Hence, our focus is on cultivating and strengthening entrepreneurial skills by supporting and capacitating Namibians especially the youths venturing into development of new products, services and enterprises that can make them self-sufficient and contribute to national development goals of job creation and poverty alleviation. It is hence our objective to assist in creating opportunities for future Namibian enterprises.

I am proud to report that close to N\$50 million has to date been allocated to various projects and developmental initiatives across all fourteen (14) regions of our country, an achievement we take great pride in. We believe that we are because the communities in which we operate makes us who we are.

The Fund will therefore continually strive to meet the socio-economic development needs of our people, in partnerships with like-minded organizations in order to contribute to the development of a better Namibia for all her people.

On behalf of my fellow Trustees of the Namport Social Investment Fund, I extend our heartfelt gratitude of having been accorded this opportunity to be able to give back to the Namibian community in this manner.

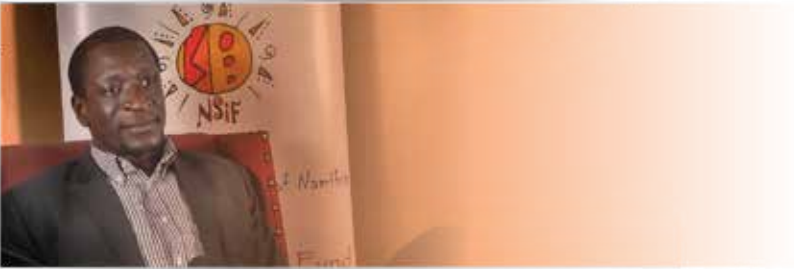

NSIF WORKING COMMITTEE

The NSIF Working Committee is the functional implementation arm of the NSIF. Tasked with the assessment of all applications and making sure they are in line with set objectives, criteria and areas of focus as set out by the NSIF, the working committee constitutes individuals within the Namport setup.

The committee meets up at least once a month to vet applications and approve and/or decline applications up to N\$50 000, and also to warrant that appropriate measures are taken to ensure that projects and/or initiatives supported are achieved in a sustainable manner.

This committee also has the responsibility to make sure the financial commitments made by the NSIF are used for the purpose originally pitched, whilst determining alternative methods of support but ensuring the same objectives are achieved. This role extends to ensuring that financial records are available for review by Namport's auditors as and when required, all the while safeguarding the financial integrity of the fund in how financial resources are utilised and accounted for.

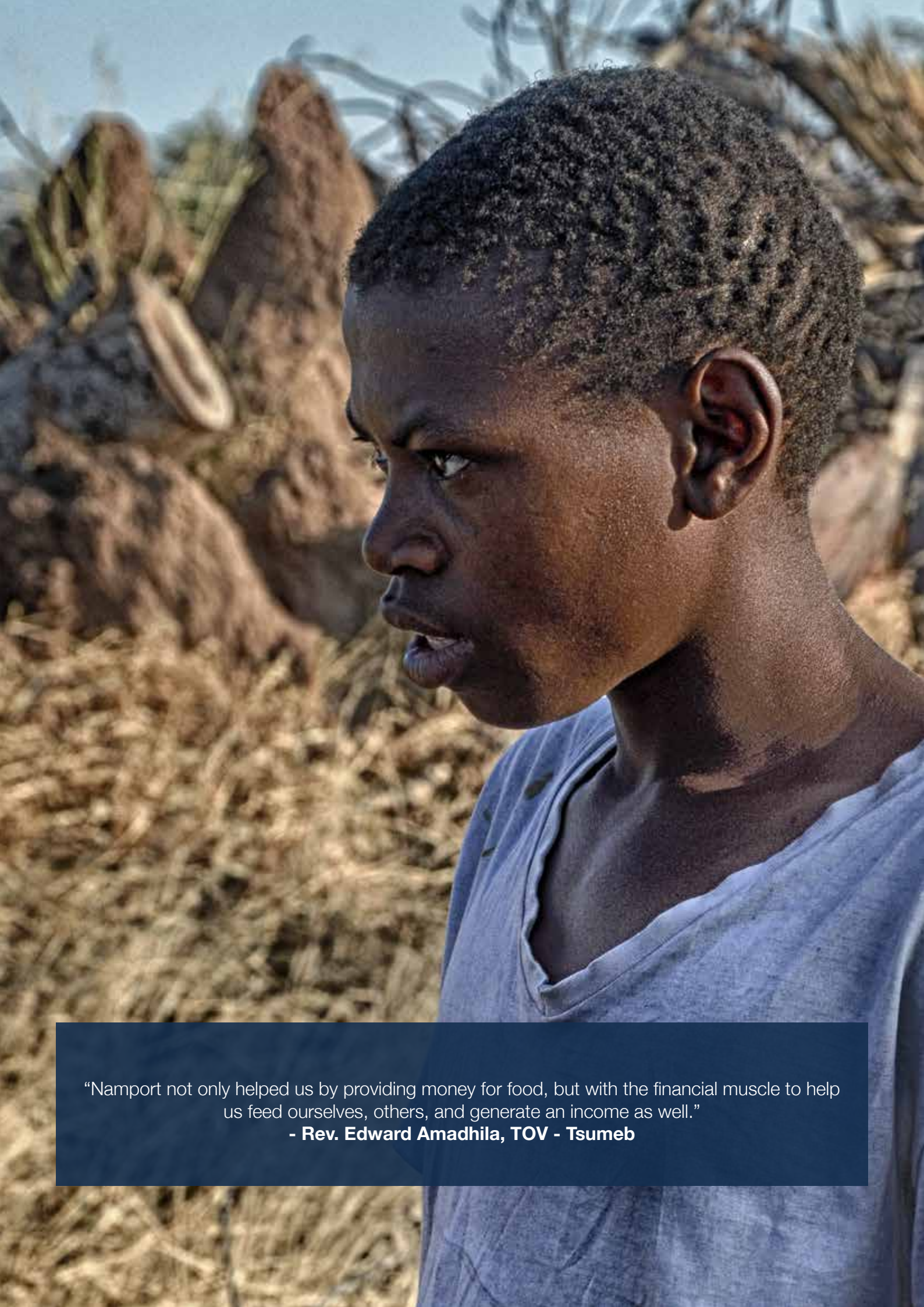
MARJORIE ELAGO | Namport Wellness Coordinator

The NSIF's focus areas span across 4 sectors, which have been identified as crucial and top priority with regard to the provision of assistance, be it financial and/or otherwise. The projects supported and undertaken by the NSIF help develop people directly and indirectly within the 4 areas of Quality Education, Health, Entrepreneurship and Community Development and the Environment.

QUALITY EDUCATION

Investment in quality education continues to be a focus area for the Fund, specifically school infrastructure and ablution facilities, thus the Fund is proud to be a "Friend in Education". NSIF is honored to report that it planted seeds in the educational fraternity by means of donating school equipment such as desks, chairs and laboratory apparatus, to mention only a few. The Onawa Secondary School in the Omusati region received 300 chairs and 300 desks valued at N\$163,848.

The Fund also inaugurated 2 classrooms at the Five Rand Primary School in the Otjozondjupa region, at a cost of N\$ 300,000.00.

As a state owned enterprise, our aim remains to make an impact across the entire country despite the fact that our operations are based in the Karas and Erongo region. It is on this basis that the Fund handed over an administration block at the Elamba Combined School in Tsandi, Omusati region valued N\$740,000.00. The administration block came as a sigh of relief to the Tsandi community who have been using an old dilapidated building for 40 years.

HEALTH

The importance of health to individuals and a nation can never be over-emphasized. As the NSIF we are more than aware just how important health is, and the positive impact a healthy and productive nation can make. Statistics have shown us that whenever social investment was increased within the health sector, a commensurate increase in the economic viability of the individuals and areas concerned was recorded. This simple fact is one of the driving forces in our decision to support the health sector.

The presence of Namport as an entity has been felt through the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic as the Namport Social Investment Fund has without fail continued its unwavering financial support towards the government's efforts in curbing the spread of the virus. Since the outbreak of the virus the NSIF has invested more than N\$1.5 million towards the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.

Through the Social Investment Fund, Namport donated a 20-foot container which was converted into ablution facilities at the Twaloloka settlement in Kuisebmond, Walvis Bay. The donation is a replacement of the previously donated mobile toilets.

Namibian Ports Authority also donated more than N\$1million towards the supply and fitment of oxygen and other urgent medical requirements at the Covid-19 facilities established at the Walvis Bay State Hospital, to mention only a few of the interventions.

Tukwathela Shelter For Pregnant Women, Outapi

Mothers staying far from hospitals are normally advised to move closer as they near their delivery dates. Accommodation was a serious problem with most of these mothers staying in tents under harsh conditions near the hospital, exposed to the elements, jeopardizing theirs and their children's health.

TUKWATHELA SHELTER FOR PREGNANT WOMEN

ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT



THE ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FOCUS AREA LOOKS AT SUPPORTING INITIATIVES THAT CONTRIBUTE TO THE EQUIPING OF NAMIBIANS ACROSS THE COUNTRY IN DIFFERENT AREAS.

The Fund sponsored IT equipment valued at N\$106,000.00, to Connect-Africa, a locally owned business, who developed a programme that will enable visually-and hearing impaired individuals to access crucial information as well as communication technology at the click of a button.

Upon completion of the pilot phase, the project aims to employ 60% of its total staff compliment with persons with visual and hearing impairment in its workforce, which is directly related to the government's efforts of poverty and unemployment eradication in Namibia as enshrined in the country's Vision 2030 document.

The Fund recently assisted eight young Namibian students to attend the Satakunta University of Applied Sciences, Finland in order to complete their practical training in pursuant of their double degree programme in Marine Engineering. This was achieved in partnering with Namibia University of Science and Technology (NUST). The scholarships are valued at N\$1,500,000.00 in total.

The NSIF has also been privileged to join hands with the Governor of the Erongo region Hon. Neville Andre, in providing dry food parcels to one hundred (100) homes in seven (7) constituencies earmarked during the World Food Commemoration Day in 2021.

The entrepreneurship and community development focus area looks at supporting initiatives that contribute to the up-skilling of Namibians across the country in different areas (through job training and community projects that generate an income for their people etc). This sector also looks at projects that are in place for direct social upliftment for vulnerable groups within communities (feeding schemes, orphan projects, etc). Support for entrepreneurship and community development continues to rise, with more and more projects being buoyed by the NSIF, as “teaching a man to fish feeds him longer than merely giving him a fish.”

Oonte OVC Centre

Apart from serving over 510 children with meals, and providing educational materials and clothing, the Oonte OVC Centre also provides meals and food parcels to needy members within the community. Its founder has purposed to ensure that no one in the community goes hungry, especially children, who she says perform better on a full stomach.

ENVIRONMENT

With each growing day, the focus on environmental issues continues to grow with companies and organisations looking for new ways to reduce their environmental footprint. The NSIF therefore saw it fit to support initiatives that concentrate on the preservation of the environment in its natural state as much as possible.

Albatross Task Force

The Albatross Task Force is a team of internationally recognised seabird experts who do seabird monitoring and compliance on fishing vessels. The task force created the Tori Line, a towed device, attached on the stern of the vessel. Its purpose is to protect the birds by preventing them from coming into contact with the fishing gear, cables and lines. The establishment of the Meme Itumbapo Craft Centre is home to elderly previously disadvantaged women who are involved in arts and crafts. These individuals were selected by the Namibia Nature Foundation to manufacture the lines.

"The NSIF not only supported this women's group but also aided in the conservation efforts being undertaken to save the birds. NSIF's support of N\$350,000 towards this project, provided sufficient resources for two years. We have managed to provide training, equipment and materials, which then empowers members of the craft center to supply the fishing industry with affordable, quality-assured, bird-scaring lines. The project will ensure that the fisheries support local "made in Walvis Bay" products too, instead of importing goods from foreign commercial agencies.

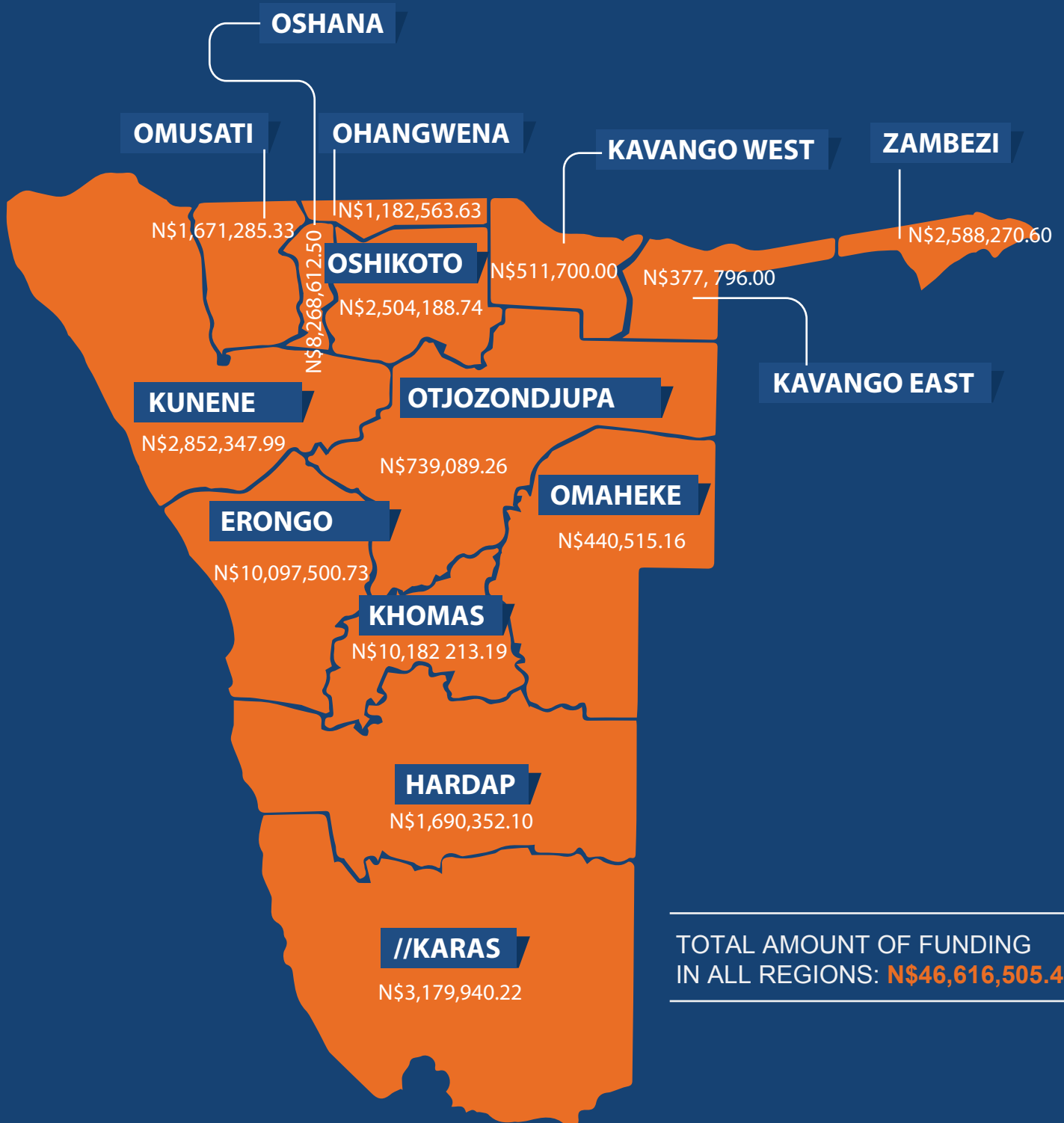

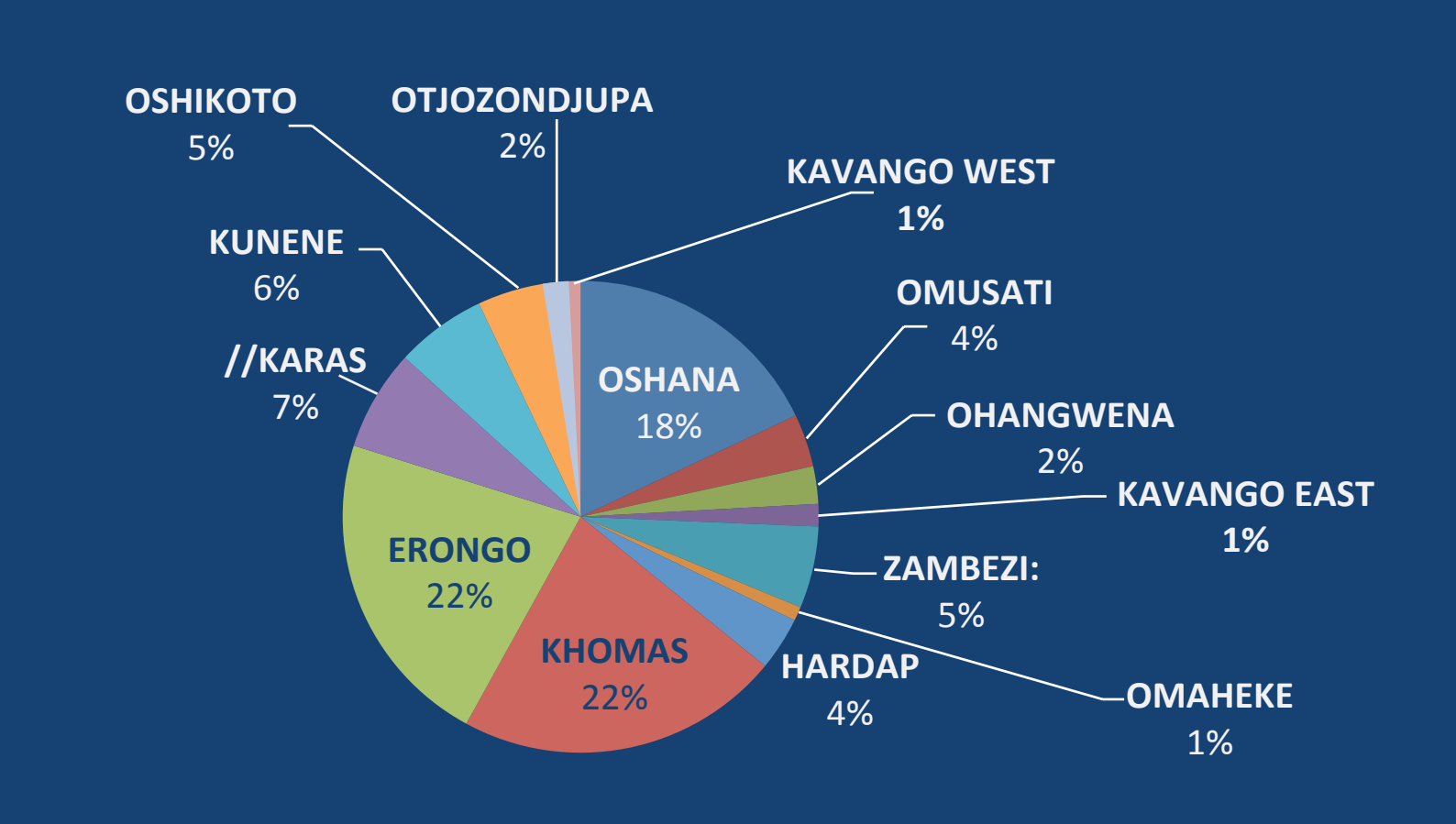
Total National Representation of Funding
